HAPPY HOLIDAYS

In 2017, Feral Cat FOCUS continued to carry out its mission of humanely reducing the feral and free-roaming cat overpopulation in Western New York through the use of Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return. As of November 15, we have provided services for approximately 2,400 cats, a milestone we would not have been able to achieve without the help of loyal community members like you.

We thank you for being part of this important effort. We cannot underscore enough what your support means to the feral cats of Western New York. Your support also means a tremendous amount to people too. We have collectively created a resource and support network for each other.

Feral Cat FOCUS's programs are entirely volunteerrun and supported solely by the financial support of the community. Thanks to the generosity of our donors and the dedicated work of our volunteers, we can guarantee that we will make a difference in our community.

2017 ACCOMPLISHEMENTS

Every day Feral Cat FOCUS volunteers work hard to make sure that compassion triumphs over cruelty. Every day we reach out to feral caregivers and local communities to help make Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return a reality for the feral and free-roaming cats of WNY.

Feral Cat FOCUS has much more work to do. In some communities it is still common practice to catch & kill feral/free-roaming cats. We are making great strides in changing this and we won't stop until every cat in every community is safe.

- As of 11/15/17 Feral Cat FOCUS spayed/neutered and vaccinated 2,056 feral/free-roaming cats. We were able to accomplish this with the help of Operation PETS Spay/Neuter Clinic of WNY.
- Feral Cat FOCUS conducted a mass trapping TNVR project in a Southtowns mobile home community. Our volunteers worked for four days and trapped over 127 cats. This included rescuing kittens from under mobile homes and from the woods surrounding the mobile home park. Feral Cat FOCUS funded all the spay/neuter surgeries & vaccinations. The mobile home management realizes it will take a few years to get the cat overpopulation under control, but they are very supportive of Feral Cat FOCUS and TNVR. We still have nine darling kittens from this project available for adoption.

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- Feral Cat FOCUS is helping the Gowanda Correctional Facility with their ongoing feral cat problem. One of the correctional facility's compassionate employees is spearheading a big TNVR project and Feral Cat FOCUS is providing guidance and financial support.
- In 2014 the City of Buffalo approved a city ordinance encouraging residents to Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return feral and free-roaming cats and budgeted \$50,000 to fund TNVR for Buffalo cats. In 2017 Buffalo caregivers spayed/neutered 404 feral/free-roaming cats using this grant. The grant only pays for spay/neuter surgery so Feral Cat FOCUS pledged \$3,000 of our own funds to aide sick or injured cats supported by this grant. We paid for antibiotics, dental procedures, parasite control and emergency medical care for injured cats.
- The Niagara County SPCA called Feral Cat FOCUS to help with a severe hoarding case. This was by far the worst case Feral Cat FOCUS has ever been asked to help with. It was horrific conditions for our volunteers that entered the house and worse for the cats living in the house. There were 54 cats in the house (five were dead kittens). Most of the cats were semi-feral but a few were friendly. Feral Cat FOCUS trapped 46 cats out of this mess. We placed 33 in barn homes. The Niagara County SPCA took eight cats. Local rescue & adoption organizations helped us with the friendly cats. We could not have accomplished this overwhelming project without our dedicated volunteers, Operation PETS Spay /Neuter Clinic of WNY, Ten Lives Club, Pets Alive WNY, Second Chance Sheltering Network, Sally Merritt-Braciak, and Kelley Casale. This project was exhausting for our volunteers and very expensive for our organization. Our financial commitment to these cats and this project has been substantial and it is not over yet!
- Feral Cat FOCUS partnered with the SPCA Serving Erie County to help the SPCA with their unadoptable cats. We took several of their cats and placed them in our Barn/Working Cat Program. In return, the SPCA took our friendly cats & kittens trapped during TNVR projects and placed them in the SPCA adoption program. Great trade off!
- In 2017 we extended our outreach by working with more communities. We were invited to give a presentation to the Attica Town Board (Wyoming County). We have been invited to speak to the Olean Town Council (Cattaraugus County).

FERAL CAT FOCUS WINTER TRAPPING POLICY

Feral Cat FOCUS does not support winter Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return (TNVR) in Western New York because our winters can be severe and temperatures can be in the teens (or below). We know that other areas of the country support winter TNVR, but their winters are not our winters with freezing temps and several feet of snow.

During winter you cannot safely trap and keep feral/free-roaming cats warm enough to heal properly after spay/neuter surgery. These cats are already struggling to stay alive and Feral Cat FOCUS will not put one more obstacle in their way.

We believe fall is the best time to do major TNVR trapping. The biggest reproduction time is over, there are fewer moms with kittens, there are fewer pregnant cats to be spayed, and spring and summer litters can be altered before mating. Some litters might get away from us, but what do we do? Sacrifice the health of the female to save kittens that might be born?

Think of it this way: A cat that just had surgery is put out in the freezing cold with an incision and shaved tummy with no fur to protect her from the cold. She is exposed to the elements. She may not have a warm dry shelter. She has to forge through a foot or more of snow to return to her colony. She has to find a food source in a snow storm. This would be cruel to do to a cat already struggling to survive a Western New York winter.

In the spring Feral Cat FOCUS will kick into high gear & begin spaying/neutering feral and free-roaming cats. We normally start scheduling surgery appointments mid-late March (depending on weather).

Never trap before you have a surgery appointment (you don't want to trap cats and then have nowhere to take them).

ARE YOU INTERESTED IN HELPING AN ORGANIZATION THAT IS MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN THE LIVES OF FERAL CATS?

Volunteers are the backbone of Feral Cat FOCUS. Our Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return program involves a range of tasks that call for a variety of skills and abilities (we will train new volunteers). Some of our most urgent needs include:

- <u>Humane TNVR Volunteers</u> help in Feral Cat FOCUS targeted areas. Often (but not always) the same volunteers transport cats to/from the spay/neuter clinic and return the cats to their trapping location after surgery. Some trapping volunteers work alone; some work with partners.
- <u>Phone Volunteers</u> work from their home to check our voicemail system for new messages. They return calls to provide information or refer message to the appropriate volunteer. They also help schedule spay/neuter surgery appointments for feral caregivers that call our phone line.
- <u>Barn/Working Cat Program Volunteers</u> deliver cats to their new home, provide guidance on the relocation process and how to acclimate cat/s to new home, set up temporary relocation cage used to help cat/s adapt to their new home.
- <u>Foster/Socialize Volunteers</u> work with feral kittens taken out of feral colonies during TNVR to help them become loving pets. The taming of feral kittens requires a daily commitment of frequent socialization sessions, patience and understanding that each kitten will come around at its own pace.

STOP FREEZING WATER KEEP TAP ON IN WINTERTIME

A common problem for caregivers in winter is preventing water from freezing. The cats need water on a regular, daily basis. This need is heightened when dry food is used as the staple diet, something that may become necessary when the moisture in canned food causes it to quickly freeze and become inedible. A number of solutions exist. Here are a few ideas:

STYROFOAM COOLER

Freezing can be delayed by placing the water bowl inside a small Styrofoam cooler. Cut a doorway in one of the short ends, leaving the bottom of the opening a few inches off the ground to prevent flooding. At the colony site, place the water bowl inside and close the lid. Weigh down with a brick or heavy rock. Be careful to use only a small Styrofoam container, one large enough to hold the water bowl and no more than one cat in a drinking position. You don't want the cats hanging around inside. If they use the "water station" as a shelter, they could get wet which would threaten their health in cold temperatures.

THE RIGHT KIND OF BOWL

The type of bowl you use can make a big difference in the speed at which water freezes. Containers with thick plastic walls, like Tupperware, are better than thin-walled bowls. Deeper bowls with narrower openings will delay freezing more than containers that are shallow and have relatively wide openings. Dark-colored bowls will absorb more heat from the sun than lighter ones.

TIRES AND ROCKS

Here's an old trick used by horse owners to keep buckets of water out in the pasture from freezing. Take an old black tire (that's off its rim) and fill it with rocks. Then tightly wedge a large bucket in the tire's hole and fill with water. During the day, the tire absorbs sunlight and heats the rocks stuffed inside. The rocks in turn radiate heat and keep the water from freezing.

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STRAW - NOT HAY FOR OUTDOOR CAT SHELTER

An outdoor cat shelter filled with straw—not hay—will keep your cats warm and cozy during the winter.

The difference between straw and hay may seem mundane, but it can actually make a world of difference for cats. They look similar, but while straw makes excellent bedding for outdoor cat shelters, hay becomes a soggy mess.

Hay is typically used to feed animals. It soaks up moisture, making it cold and uncomfortable for cats—and has the potential to get moldy. And in the winter, a wet bed can even be dangerous, making cats more likely to get sick.

Straw, the dry leftover stalks from harvested crops, repels moisture, making it the best bedding for outdoor cat shelters. Loosely pack straw in shelter to the quarter or halfway point. Straw can last decades when stored properly—in a dry place and off the ground, such as a wood pallet.

Straw is a lot less expensive than hay. Straw is tough, thick, lightweight, and yellow or golden. Hay is usually heavy and green, but there are varieties, so if you aren't sure—ask!

DO NOT USE folded newspaper, blankets, towels, carpeting, or any material that holds moisture in shelters. Cats can only lie on top of these materials so they actually draw out body heat and defeat purpose by making the cat colder.

DURING THE WINTER CAREGIVERS NEED TO...

Provide Warm Dry Shelter

Feral cats typically build a protective coat for winter, but the effectiveness of their fur as insulation is greatly reduced if it becomes wet or frozen and can often times result in hypothermia. Feral cats can get frostbite on their ears, nose and paws. They can die from exposure if some protection from the elements is not available.

Provide Extra Food During & Fresh Water

A recent study found cats in cold climates eat approximately 15% more food during wintertime than in summer. This can be explained by the need in colder temperatures for their bodies to burn more calories to stay warm. To keep your colony cats at a healthy body weight when cold weather arrives, increase their portions by about 15%.

FERAL CATS ARE AT HOME OUTSIDE, BUT THEY CAN USE EXTRA HELP IN COLD WEATHER

In cold weather, shelter is actually more important for feral cats than food. Feral cats need warm, dry shelter to protect them.

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Provide enough shelters for everyone. Some cats like to mingle; some cats prefer to have their own space. Cats rely on body heat to stay warm, so keep your shelters small for only a few cats. For more populated colonies, go with multiple shelters or a larger size.
